Kobodaishi, "Kukai," founded the 88 Temple Pilgrimage. Amidst the chirping of the cicadas, I walked as a pilgrim, wiping the sweat from my brow. When I saw the temple gate ahead, I felt the fresh wind blow not by me, but through me.

Byodoji A Well From Which Clear "Kobo Water" Springs Byodoji is the 22nd temple of the Shikoku Site **Temple** Pilgrimage. Kobodaishi carved a statue of Yakushinyorai, a monk to whom the temple was sacred, and called it Byodoji (Equality Temple) because he endeavored to save everyone equally. An old legend tells that Kobodaishi once drove a cedar walking stick into the ground, and that stick became a giant cedar tree. On the site of Byodoji, a thousand-year-old towering cedar stands with the grandeur of that legend.

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Kobodaishi founded Tairyuji, the 21st temple of the Shikoku 88 Temple Pilgrimage The temple stands 602 meters above sea level, and the surrounding territory is full of giant, centuries-old cedar and cypress trees. The grounds are dotted with the maintemple, Daishi temple, Tahou Temple, and the bell tower. These are particularly striking among the sites of the 88 Temple Pilgrimage. Natural mountain foliage gives comfort to visitors no matter the season.

A Steep Climb for Pilgrims

The approach to Tairyuji is a steep slope. It is one of three such grueling climbs on the long pilgrimage, along with Shouzan and Kakurin Temples.Nowadays, though, one can easily take the ropeway from Washinosato up to the temple gate. In spring and fall, though, it is recommended to enjoy the hike on foot, which takes roughly 30 minutes.
